# **Clergy Corner**

## **Dear Friends**

I am delighted to be writing approaching my first Christmas as Priest in Charge (Vicar) of Steep and Froxfield with Privett. I've been connected with the parishes for a few years, happily working alongside Revd John Owen, and this is the start of a new chapter.

December might be the end of the year (and exactly *where* has 2023 gone??), but it's all about new beginnings in Church life. As Advent Calendars are cracked open, the countdown starts. Advent means 'beginning' or 'arrival' after all.

My favourite Advent Calendar was given to my eldest daughter when she was young. It starts with a wooden board painted with a simple colourful landscape scene. There are 24 peg-holes, each with a number. Each morning we dig through a bag to find the little figure painted with the day's date and plug it onto the picture in its right spot. One day there's a sheep, then a shepherd, an angel or a donkey. The anticipation builds as we look for the next character and remember the story of the first Christmas together. We find Joseph, Mary and finally the baby, Jesus. By Christmas Day, instead of just an empty shell of wrapping where chocolate used to be, this Advent Calendar has built up into a full nativity scene with all the characters in the stable, with a big yellow star overhead.

The picture is complete when we place Jesus safely in his manger-bed, surrounded by everyone who has rushed to discover who has been born. Glorious angels singing from the rooftops, shepherds venturing in from their outdoor life, more used to lambs than babies. There are even wise travellers drawn by a star to find themselves worshipping a king nestled in a throne of hay, not in the golden palace they were expecting.

And here is God. In this simple cowshed is where heaven touches earth. This baby is where God reaches down to bring his love to every one of us, to show that we are not forgotten, that none of us is too unimportant, or grand, or too young, or too far gone, or too anything-at-all for God. As the tiny new-born opens his eyes and takes his first breath, we realise that God remembers every one of us, knows us completely, and loves us fully.

This new beginning was worth waiting for.

To celebrate the wonder of Christmas we are planning some lovely Christmas celebrations in the coming weeks. There are Carol Services at all our churches to enjoy, the children's Christmas Eve Crib Service and Midnight Communion as well as celebrations in Steep and Froxfield on Christmas morning for the whole family. We look forward to seeing you to come and worship together.

Finally, thank you to everyone for such a very warm welcome to me in this new role – it was wonderful to be surrounded by so many friendly faces at my licensing service at High Cross in October, and I am loving getting to know more people better, now that I'm living in the Vicarage. If you see me around please stop and say hello, or send me a note/email!

# . More details about the Reverse Advent Calendar

In November's Magazine we explained the plans for the Reverse Advent Calendar which, for December, is a joint project by Froxfield School and the village to provide contributions to the PACT Foodbank in Petersfield. In summary, for each day in December to 21 December you can leave a gift of food, toiletries, etc in marked bags at the back of the church for the Foodbank – reversing the normal Advent Calendar by giving rather than receiving. The church is open every day from 8.30am to 5.00pm, and you can drop off your gifts at any time. Gifts will be removed from the church on a regular basis and taken directly to the Foodbank.



# Is There a Future for Froxfield Village Hall?

As readers will know from previous articles, Froxfield Village Hall is under-funded and underutilised. It is run as a charity, in accordance with the terms of a 1937 Trust Deed, to serve the local

community, supporting its physical and mental wellbeing through providing a venue to meet and/or be active, whether as a venue for a club or society, for a private party or meeting, or for community events organised by volunteers.

There are insufficient funds to complete the maintenance work required at the hall and before the Trustees embark upon finding these funds, we first need to consider if there is a financially viable future.

The Trustees' need to establish:

- 1. whether or not there is support for the Village Hall to remain open,
- 2. what sort of events locals would want to attend or use it for, and
- 3. Whether there are sufficient volunteers to help put on these events.

Would you like to start a Movie Night club, a Table Tennis club, a Yoga class, or something else? Please send your ideas, thoughts and any concerns to me. If you'd like to volunteer to help run our pop-up nights, or help organise a Fete in the summer, or simply to make a donation, please contact me.

At the beginning of November Froxfield school held an open morning for prospective families whose children will be starting school next September. Whilst the Headteacher, Mrs Farrow, is always pleased to show interested parents around the school, the open morning provides a great opportunity for visitors to be shown the building and all its classrooms accompanied by children from class 4 who act as splendid ambassadors for the school, of which they ware clearly so proud.

Mrs Farrow has described the school site as "like a hidden gem behind the small frontage" and the staff and governors alike take so much pride and enjoyment in talking to prospective new parents, giving them an insight into life and learning at Froxfield. As always, the class 4 children themselves were the school's greatest advert. Many visitors commented on how impressed they were by the confidence and articulate explanations of the Year 5/6 children. They really give parents an understanding of school life from a child's perspective. Well done class 4.

Life in the preschool is always busy with new and interesting experiences provided for the youngest children in the school. Earlier in November a representative from Barnardo's came to visit the preschool. She bought with her a crocodile puppet who played games with an oral health theme. The children learnt how to clean their teeth properly and for how long, also learning about which foods are healthy and which are best eaten as treats. I'm told it was a fun morning, rounded off with each child being given a toothbrush and toothpaste to take home.

Christmas in school is always a favourite time of year. Preparations for the Nativity play are already underway and the children will also be looking forward to many festive events including a visit to Wintershall living Nativity, Christmas lunch, Christmas Jumper Day and other Christmas activities.road.

# **Froxfield School continued**

The school is always conscious of participating in and contributing to the local community and once again is planning to participate in the Reverse Advent Calendar initiative in conjunction with the Froxfield High Cross parish. Last year, this was hugely successful and I know from speaking to volunteers at PACT Food Bank that our donations made a significant difference to the Christmases of many families within our local area.

This year the Food Bank suggested that the children themselves should choose what should go into the collection for each day of Advent. As you will read elsewhere in the magazine there will be large paper bags for each day of Advent located in the back of St Peter's church ready for the contributions and everyone in the parish is invited to donate to this excellent cause for families who otherwise wouldn't have the funds to buy any Christmas fare.

Froxfield school seeks to offer its children a wide range of trips to a variety of educational experiences, however with the costs of coach hire soaring, this is only possible with the help of our team of volunteer minibus drivers with whose help the schools is able to keep the cost down. We are excited to announce that this very special event, Carols on the Green, with **live music** is back by popular demand this year!


